The Basingstoke & District Disability Forum recently identified a lack of Basingstoke based support groups for people affected by the condition fibromyalgia. We responded to this need by creating two new Chronic Pain Support Groups, both take place once a month. We run our evening sessions on the first Tuesday of the month from 6pm to 8pm at Popley Fields Community Centre. The daytime sessions take place on the third Mondays from 1pm to 3pm at The Roger Morris Centre, Eastrop Way. Booking is not required, you are welcome to come along if you are affected by any chronic pain condition or are a carer of someone suffering with such a condition.

The sessions are an opportunity to meet people with common experiences or concerns in a relaxed environment and to provide each other with encouragement, comfort and advice. For me, the morning of Saturday 2 November 2019 was an anti-climax. Like many others, I watched the Rugby World Cup final with a mix of frustration and disappointment. How could England play so well throughout the tournament, especially in the semi final against New Zealand, and then struggle so much in the final? Of course, credit should be given to South Africa, but I felt very deflated for much of the game and almost turned the TV off straight after the final whistle.

I was glad I didn't, as we began to hear the inspiring story of South Africa's captain, Siya Kolisi, who grew up in a poor township of Zwide, just outside Port Elizabeth on the Eastern Cape.

His desire was to win the world cup, to help bring the country together and inspire every kid in the country.

I couldn't help but be moved by his story. From growing up without money and not knowing where the next meal would come from, Siya Kolisi's story reminds us that there is hope, both for individual people and for a nation. Our future doesn't have to be defined by our past.

### We are Digital—EU Settlement Scheme

Local residents can get help and support on changes that may affect them following Brexit.

Supported by Basingstoke and Deane Borough Council, Citizens Advice Basingstoke and Tadley will be providing a new service to support residents in the borough affected by changes as a result of Brexit.

European citizens living in the UK are required to apply to the EU Settlement Scheme to continue living in the UK after 30 June 2021, with an estimated 7,000 people currently living in the borough needing to apply to the scheme.

Other support the charity will provide includes guidance on employment rights and EU employees' rights to stay, UK citizens living overseas and looking to return and consumer concerns such as travel insurance and access to healthcare.

As well as help and support from Citizens Advice, digital assistance is available for residents who do not have the access, skills or confidence to complete the online form by appointment at Viables Community Centre.

Viables Memory Club

The Viables Memory Club is a weekly facility which provides people with dementia the opportunity to participate in a wide range of activities that will encourage and engage thought processes and activate physical movement for greater health and wellbeing. It offers carers and families a little respite when their loved one uses the service and creates a routine for members to follow, adding consistency and stability.

Running each Friday, it is intended to provide a safe environment for people who are at the earlier stages of dementia (though most of our members stay with us for a long time) to undertake activities and socialise, whilst being supported by staff and volunteers who have been trained with an awareness of the needs of supporting someone living with dementia.

The Memory Club is a popular service in the area and is appreciative of any support that it receives, including grant funding and volunteers. ## In this month's How It All Began...

#### THE PANTOMIME

Pantomime, or Panto as it is more commonly known, is an annual British theatrical ritual which takes place nationwide and has travelled across the globe in both amateur and professional theatre companies.

It was born, however, in the Italian street theatre of the Commedia dell'arte, back in the 16<sup>th</sup> century, with stories of the old man, Pantalone, the clown Pierrot, and Columbine – the girl in love with the naughty servant, Arlecchino.







There are similarities between these performances and our modern-day pantos with a principal boy and girl who would overcome everything for love and live happily ever after.

The English for Arlecchino is Harlequin, and in the late 1600's the Harlequin, a mute panto character, used a paddle made from two pieces of wood which made a slapping sound when it hit someone...and from this we get the word 'Slapstick'.

The clown had always been a minor part, but in 1800 Actor Joseph Grimaldi took the character to popular new heights, turning the clown into a loveable and mischievous rogue.

The clown took over from the Harlequin and Grimaldi invented many of the gags we see in panto today. A modern example of a clown is the role of Buttons in Cinderella.



Early pantomimes were silent, or "dumb show", performances consisting of only dancing and gestures but by the late 1800's Pantomime had become popular entertainment fare at Christmas time. There were, however, only three theatres that were allowed to perform spoken drama, so to get around the law, theatres would add music and dance alongside.

Two writers at the time, James Planché and Henry James Byron, elevated the fairy tale aspect of the panto and performances became lavish with large casts from popular music hall stars and variety artists.

By the 1960's, many West End theatres could no longer afford the huge costs of running a pantomime and the art went into decline. Then, breaking with the tradition of a female role, Norman Wisdom played principal boy in Aladdin at the London Palladium for 15 years.

The theatre held many pantos up until 1988. They restarted Pantomimes again in 2016 with Cinderella.

In the 1970's, with the sexual liberation of the decade, pantomime moved away from the traditional family entertainment, becoming more risqué and adult oriented. Following a downturn in sales it reverted back to the more popular family friendly format.

#### 1980's, 90's and 00's

Pantomimes now often star British celebrities and sometimes even big Hollywood names such as David Hasselhoff and Pamela Anderson have come to the UK just to get involved in the British tradition. The use of celebrities in panto roles dates back more than 100 years.

And of course, no panto would be complete without audience participation.

The classic lines are: "He's behind you!" and "Oh no he's not!" followed by "Oh yes he is!"



Christmas Day—Christmas Eucharist and Carols at 10.00am




