As the days lengthen and we all enjoy the signs of new life that are showing in our gardens and along the hedgerows, the church is in the midst of the season of Lent. We take Lent very seriously as a time of spiritual preparation for Easter and our focus is on looking at our own lives and faith and considering how we can draw closer to God and live more truly according to his way. So, many people try to pray more regularly and give more thought to the teachings of Jesus, to be more generous in their giving and to think of others before themselves. That's not always easy and sometimes involves some real soul-searching as we turn away from those things that we know fall short of God's hopes for us and try to make a new beginning.

To help you, as well as our regular Sunday worship, we offer these special services for Lent, Holy Week and Easter:

Mothering Sunday: March 22nd 10.00am when we will be giving posies to mothers and others who care for us, as a way of saying thank you.

Palm Sunday: April 5th at 10.00am when we remember how Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey, and at 6.30pm for the Stations of the Cross.

Maundy Thursday: April 9th at 7.30pm when we remember how Jesus celebrated the Last Supper with his disciples and washed their feet.

Good Friday April 10th at 2.00pm when we remember Jesus death on the cross.

Easter Sunday April 12th at 10.00am when we celebrate the joy of resurrection with flowers and candles and Easter eggs!

Hub Community Church

At the start of this year I was reflecting on it being 20 years since the millennium. Maybe you weren't even alive at the start of the century, or maybe you can remember the build-up to what promised to be the party of all parties. I was in my late teens and remember it being quite an anti-climax! But I remember praying as we started a new century. I still pray today.

As a church, we have started 2020 with a focus on prayer. Prayer can seem to many people a solemn and boring activity, but the reality is that almost all of us pray at times in our lives, even if we're not sure that anyone is listening, and usually in a time of crisis.

I grew up thinking that prayer was something only really serious, religious and committed people did, but have discovered that prayer is for everyone. In 2015, a YouGov poll of British beliefs showed that a quarter of those who described themselves as 'non-religious' admit that they 'take part in some spiritual activity each month, typically prayer'.

Pete Greig, an author and Church leader in Guildford writes, 'Everyone prays. It's instinctive. In fact, a recent survey of young adults in the UK showed that 93% pray. When a plane is crashing even atheists yell 'help!''

Many of the churches in Basingstoke recently took part in an initiative called 'Try Praying'. It encourages those who want to have a go at praying, to give it a go each day for a week. A small booklet leads you through some simple prayers and the reasons for saying them. On their website, Trypraying say that, "Trypraying is for those who are not religious and don't do church". 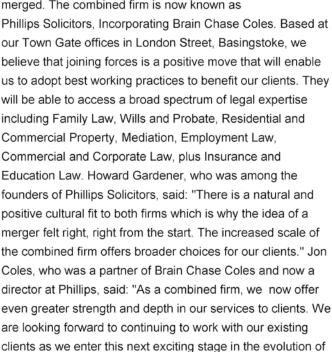

In this month's How It All Began...

EASTER TRADITIONS

Spring is at last creeping over the windowsill, bringing with it all those accepted wonders of this time of year. We begin to see new growth all around as hedgerows tease with just a haze of green. In the breeze, brave crocuses bob their heads and, together with the sturdy daffodil, spill brilliant colour over the verges. Lambs bounce and caper in the fields and the birds in our gardens wake us ever earlier with their enthusiastic songs; all feeling that surge of a certain spring in their hearts.

So, what have we humans, got to look forward to each Spring? Well, there's chocolate, of course because Easter happens in Spring and that's what Easter is all about isn't it? Well, maybe – but originally it wasn't. This turn of the season meant something different in earliest times and across other cultures.

For Christians, Easter is considered the most important festival of the Christian Calendar. It was at this time, the Bible says, that Jesus Christ died on the cross bearing the weight of mankind's sins. The miracle, we are told, occurred three days later when Jesus was resurrected by God and came back to life to show that death may be overcome.

Interestingly, Easter and Jewish Passover, which has been celebrated since around 1300BC, are festivals of equal gravity. Side by side they bring to light the deep structures of both religions. Passover can be called the Festival of Spring and was an agricultural festival which marked the beginning of the cycle of production and harvest during the time the Jews lived in ancient Palestine. Both, then, symbolise hope and new life and the importance of starting afresh and both are scheduled to coincide in the spring.

HOW IT ALL BEGAN IN BRITAIN

Most historians, including Biblical scholars, agree that Easter was originally a pagan festival. According to the New Unger's Bible Dictionary:

"The word Easter is of Saxon origin, <u>Eostre</u>, the goddess of spring, in whose honour sacrifices were offered around Passover time each year. By the eighth century Anglo—Saxons had adapted the name [to Easter] and, [putting aside its pagan origins,] declared it the celebration of Christ's resurrection."

That's not all. There was also a Celtic Goddess of Spring called *Ostara*, for whom painted eggs and white rabbits were sacred. I think we are beginning to see some interesting patterns emerging.

EASTER TODAY

Easter falls on different dates each year, depending upon the cycle of the moon, between 21 March and 25 April. This year, 2020, Easter Sunday falls on the 12th April.

There are iconic symbols to mark Easter - such as chocolate Easter eggs, the Easter bunny, and Easter Bonnets, but where do these modern conventions come from?

Many of us enjoy chocolate eggs at Easter, but these are a very recent development. Did you know, for example, that for many years church leaders forbade the eating of eggs during the week leading up to Easter, (known as Holy Week), as this was part of the longer period of abstinence that we know as Lent. Any eggs laid that week, then, were saved and decorated to make them Holy Week eggs.

These were given to children as gifts. In time, the Victorians adapted the custom in their inimitable style with satin-covered

cardboard eggs filled with Easter gifts. This has now developed into the giving of Easter Egg gifts; a tradition that many people enjoy today.

BUT WHY ARE EASTER EGGS MADE OF CHOCOLATE?

The first chocolate eggs appeared in France and Germany in the 19th Century but they were bitter and hard, so not a great hit. As chocolate-making techniques improved, and the product became smoother, sweeter, and chocolatiers became more creative, hollow eggs like the ones we have today were developed. They very quickly became popular and remain a favourite treat for chocolate-lovers today.

WHAT'S WITH THE EASTER BUNNY?

The story of the Easter Bunny, albeit biologically confusing, is thought to have become popular in the 19th Century but could



well have been based on the much earlier pagan goddess, remember Celtic *Ostara* and her love of rabbits and eggs?

Rabbits usually give birth to a big litter of babies (called kittens), so they were

adopted as a symbol of new life. Legend has it that the Easter Bunny lays, decorates and hides eggs for children to enjoy hunting for as part of the festival.

By the way, the Easter Bunny doesn't get it all her own way. In Switzerland, Easter eggs are delivered by a cuckoo and in parts of Germany, by a fox!

AND EASTER BONNETS?

It was usual to have new clothes at Easter following the deprivations and fasting of Lent and bonnets are also linked to the custom of wearing 'Your Sunday Best' to church, so at this time of celebration, your 'Best' had to be the Very Best!

The bonnet was a hat depicting Easter and spring, bedecked with bunnies, flowers, eggs, etc. and made famous by Irving Berlin's 1930's song New York City Easter Parade:



"In your Easter bonnet With all the frills upon it

You'll be the grandest lady in the Easter Parade!"

AND FINALLY, HOT CROSS BUNS

Well, here we must return to our aforementioned Spring Goddess, *Eostre*. Sue Ellen Thompson, author of Holiday Symbols and Customs writes:

"The pagans worshipped the goddess Eostre by serving tiny cakes, often decorated with a cross, at their annual spring festival."



Of course, these little cakes have been adapted over the centuries and today they are a spiced sweet bun filled with currants or raisins and marked with a cross on the top. They are traditionally served on Good Friday because of the association of the cross

with the crucifixion. Additionally, they are appreciated across the globe, being enjoyed in the United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Canada, and India...

Oh, and one last interesting fact: If taken on a sea voyage, hot cross buns are said to protect against shipwreck.

DRIVERS REQUIRED

We provide a service for elderly people in YOUR community. Particularly for those who find it difficult to use public transport or lack the confidence to go out on their own. We provide a driving service to pick them up from home, take them to their appointment and bring them home again, using our volunteers own car. We also take clients shopping, to social events such as lunch clubs, helping them remain part of their community.



We need drivers who can spare a few hours a week during the day time, Monday to Friday, and who have a car that is comprehensively insured and suitable for carrying an elderly person. In return we will cover your petrol cost from home currently we pay 45p per mile. Some of our driver currently work shifts and can only offer 1 or part of a day per week but even this amount of time can help us. You can choose what hours/days you are available and what duties you undertake.

BEFRIENDERS REQUIRED

Would you have an hour a week free? Many elderly people would love to have someone to come and see them for a cup of tea and a chat. You could be the first person they see that week who has time just for them! You will gain great satisfaction and help them to relieve their loneliness. We try to find you someone who lives near to you so that if you do not have your own transport you can walk to them. But if you have to use your car or public transport we will reimburse your costs. We particularly need people who are available during the daytime on weekdays.

We need people who have time and patience and like talking to elderly people. You need to have good listening skills and be able to show empathy. We will provide you with training and support and match you with one of our clients. Our befriending co-ordinator will take you to your first meeting with our client and support you as necessary.

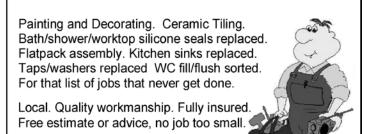

Memory Club

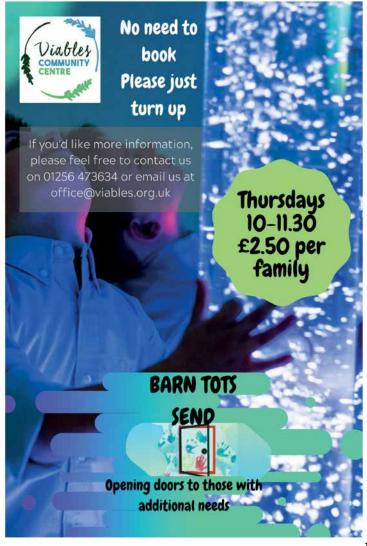

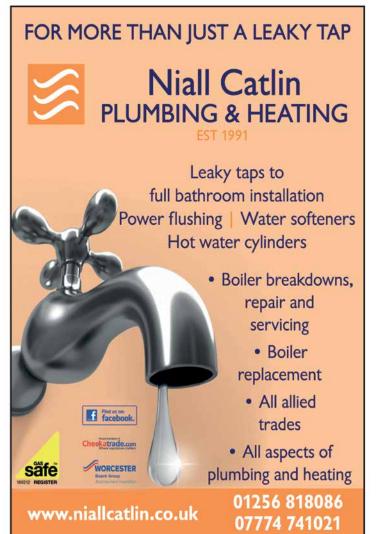


The Viables Memory Club is a weekly facility which provides people with dementia the opportunity to participate in a wide range of activities that will encourage and engage thought processes and activate physical movement for greater health and wellbeing. It offers carers and families a little respite when their loved one uses the service and creates a routine for members to follow, adding consistency and stability. Running each Friday, it is intended to provide a safe environment for people who are at the earlier stages of dementia (though most of our members stay with us for a long time) to undertake activities and socialise, whilst being supported by staff and volunteers who have been trained with an awareness of the needs of supporting someone living with dementia.

The Memory Club is a popular service in the area and is appreciative of any support that it receives, including grant funding and volunteers.
